Bureau County is a county located in the state of Illinois. As of 2000, the population is 35,503. The County was organized out of Putnam County in 1837. It is named for Pierre de Beuro who, around 1818, established a trading post near where Bureau Creek empties into the Illinois River. Its county seat is Princeton, Illinois.
