Calhoun County is a county located in the State of Illinois. The County was organized in 1825, and was named for John C. Calhoun, Vice President of the United States, and proponent of States' rights. Its county seat is Hardin, Illinois.

Calhoun County Geography

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, the county has a total area of 735 km (284 mi). 657 km (254 mi) of it is land and 77 km (30 mi) of it is water. The total area is 10.53% water.

Calhoun County is a narrow finger of high ground located between the Mississippi River and the Illinois River. From the rest of Illinois, and Missouri, it is accessible mainly by ferry boat. This County had many prosperous farms and orchards at a time when transportation was mainly by river.
