## POULTRY AND OTHER LIVESTOCK

Total value of production from eggs was \$262.2 million in 2000, up slightly from a year earlier. The average number of layers at 22.7 million was 3 percent above 1999. The average rate of lay was up 4 percent to 269 eggs per layer, resulting in a 4 percent increase in total egg production during 2000. The average price received by producers for eggs was 51.6 cents per dozen compared with 51.7 cents a year earlier.
