

POULTRY AND OTHER LIVESTOCK

Total value of production from eggs was \$285.7 million in 1998, down 5 percent from a year earlier. The average number of layers at 21.8 million was 3 percent above 1997. The average rate of lay was up slightly to 268 eggs per layer, resulting in a 3 percent increase in total egg production during 1998. The average price received by producers for eggs was 58.8 cents per dozen compared with 63.7 cents a year earlier.
