## Kansas Agricultural Statistics

Cooperating with the Kansas Department of Agriculture

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### 2006 Cash Receipts

Cash receipts from 2006 farm marketings in Kansas were \$10.34 billion, up 2 percent from 2005. Livestock receipts increased 2 percent, accounting for 67 percent of all receipts. Crop receipts also increased, up 4 percent, accounting for the remaining 33 percent. Total direct government payments were down 40 percent for the year.

Gross income per Kansas farm, prior to inventory adjustment, increased 1 percent from 2005's level. Total production expenses increased 3 percent for the year. Net income per farm, after inventory adjustment, averaged \$25,223 in 2006, down \$12,905 from the year earlier. See detailed data in the accompanying tables.
