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Kansas Cattle on Feed

The number of **cattle on feed** on May 1, 2008 in Kansas feedlots with 1,000 head or more capacity totaled 2.29 million head, down 3 percent from a year ago and down 5 percent from April 1, 2008. **Placements** during April totaled 360,000 head, up 1 percent from a year ago and 18 percent below March 2008 placements of 440,000 head. **Marketings** during April totaled 470,000 head, 6 percent above April 2007 and 13 percent above March 2008. **Other disappearance** was 20,000 head, down 20,000 from a year ago and up 5,000 head from the previous month. The percent of April placements by weight was: under 600 pounds, 13 percent; 600-699 pounds, 19 percent; 700-799 pounds, 32 percent; and 800 pounds or heavier, 36 percent.

U.S. Cattle on Feed

Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market in the United States in feedlots with capacity of 1,000 or more head totaled 11.1 million head on May 1, 2008. The inventory was 1 percent below May 1, 2007 and 4 percent below May 1, 2006. **Placements** in feedlots during April totaled 1.54 million, 2 percent below 2007 and 5 percent below 2006. Net placements were 1.46 million. During April, placements of cattle and calves weighing less than 600 pounds were 315,000; 600-699 pounds were 278,000; 700-799 pounds were 428,000; and 800 pounds and greater were 515,000. **Marketings** of fed cattle during April totaled 2.01 million, 11 percent above 2007 and 13 percent above 2006. This is the highest fed cattle marketings for the month of April since the series began in 1996. **Other disappearance** totaled 75,000 during April, 24 percent below 2007 and 14 percent below 2006.

Kansas Cattle and Milk: Production, Disposition, And Income

Cattle production in Kansas grossed 6.33 billion dollars in 2007, up 1 percent from 2006. Average cattle price was \$93.90 per hundredweight, up \$5.30 from previous year. Calf price per hundredweight was down \$9.00 from last year to \$126.00. Value of **milk** production in Kansas totaled 415.1 million dollars in 2007, up 39 percent from 2006. Average returns per hundredweight totaled \$19.30, up \$6.60.
