## KENTUCKY SOYBEAN AND WINTER WHEAT PRICES CONTINUE STRONG

Prices received for commodities sold by **Kentucky** farmers at mid-September were lower with four exceptions. Commodities that increased in price for mid-month were soybeans, winter wheat, milk and sows.

Cattle prices for mid-September were down from the previous month. **Steers and heifers** 500 lbs. and over averaged \$103.00 per cwt. (hundredweight) for mid-month. This was a decrease of \$2.00 from the August price and \$4.00 from September 2006. **Beef cow** price at mid-September was \$47.00 per cwt., down \$1.00 from the previous month but up \$1.00 from September last year. **Calves** less than 500 pounds averaged \$112.00 per cwt. at mid-month. This was down \$3.00 from the August price and \$13.00 from September 2006.

Hog prices were mixed as barrows and gilts were down in price while sows were up. **Barrows and gilts** for mid-September were \$44.00 per cwt., down \$6.00 from August and \$5.00 from September a year ago. This would be the lowest barrow and gilt price in six months. **Sow** prices for mid-month increased to \$43.00 per cwt. This was up \$1.00 from August and \$6.00 from September 2006. The mid-September sow price would be the highest since June 2005.

Sheep and lamb prices were mixed for August with sheep increasing in price from July while lambs decreased. The August **sheep** price was \$30.00 per cwt., up \$5.00 from July while down \$5.00 from August 2006. The **lamb** price was \$92.00 per cwt. for August. This was down \$7.00 from the July price while up \$9.00 from August 2006.

Price of **all milk** for mid-September was \$24.20 per cwt. This was up 20 cents from the August price and \$10.60 from September 2006. This would be the highest Kentucky milk price on record. Demand for milk products both home and abroad has brought about the dramatic increase in the price of milk. The final milk price will vary from the projected mid-month milk price due to price changes announced by the Milk Marketing Orders, actual milk fat content and quantity sold by milk classes.

Grain prices for the month were mixed with corn decreasing in price while soybean and winter wheat prices were up. The price of **corn** at mid-September was \$3.25 per bushel. This was down 10 cents from the August price while up 91 cents from September 2006. This would be the lowest corn price in eight months. **Soybeans** for mid-month were up 59 cents from August at \$8.60 per bushel. The mid-month price was also up \$3.23 from September a year earlier. This would be the highest soybean price since July 2004. **Winter wheat** at mid-September was \$7.50 per bushel, up \$1.75 from August and \$4.09 from September 2006. This would be the highest winter wheat price on record.

The preliminary **U.S.** All Farm Products Index of Prices Received by Farmers in September, at 142 percent, based on 1990-92=100, increased 2 points (1.4 percent) from August. The Crop Index advanced 3 points (2.1 percent) and the Livestock Index increased 2 points (1.4 percent). Producers received higher commodity prices for wheat, lettuce, eggs, and cattle. Lower prices were received for hogs, corn, strawberries, and onions. The overall index is also affected by the seasonal change based on a 3-year average mix of commodities producers sell. Increased average marketings of soybeans, corn, apples, and peanuts offset decreased marketings of cattle, wheat, broilers, and grapes. The preliminary All Farm Products Index is up 23 points (19 percent) from September 2006. The Food Commodities Index, at 146, increased 3 points (2.1 percent) from last month and 24 points (20 percent) from September 2006.

## SEPTEMBER 1 HOG & PIG INVENTORY

**U.S.** inventory of all hogs and pigs on September 1, 2007, was 64.6 million head. This was up 3 percent from both September 1, 2006, and June 1, 2007. Breeding inventory, at 6.14 million head, was up 1 percent from last year, and up slightly from the previous quarter. Market hog inventory, at 58.5 million head, was up 3 percent from both last year and last quarter.

The June-August 2007 **U.S.** pig crop, at 27.5 million head, was up 4 percent from each of the last two years. Sows farrowing during this period totaled 2.99 million head, up 3 percent from 2006 and up 2 percent from 2005. The sows farrowed during this quarter represented 49 percent of the breeding herd. The average pigs saved per litter was 9.19 for

the June-August 2007 period, compared to 9.11 last year. Pigs saved per litter by size of operation ranged from 7.50 for operations with 1-99 hogs to 9.30 for operations with more than 5,000 hogs and pigs.

**U.S.** hog producers intend to have 2.96 million sows farrow during the September-November 2007 quarter, up 1 percent from the actual farrowings in 2006, and up 2 percent from 2005. Intended farrowings for December 2007-February 2008, at 2.94 million sows, are up 1 percent from 2007, and up 4 percent from 2006. The total number of hogs under contract, owned by operations with over 5,000 head, but raised by contractees, accounted for 40 percent of the total **U.S.** hog inventory, up from 39 percent last year.



## CATTLE ON FEED

**Cattle and calves on feed** for slaughter market in the United States for feedlots with capacity of 1,000 or more head totaled 10.3 million head on September 1, 2007. The inventory was 6 percent below September 1, 2006 but 3 percent above September 1, 2005. **Placements** in feedlots during August totaled 2.12 million, 7 percent below 2006 but 6 percent above 2005. Net placements were 2.07 million. During August, placements of cattle and calves weighing less than 600 pounds were 490,000, 600-699 pounds were 440,000, 700-799 pounds were 549,000, and 800 pounds and greater were 640,000. **Marketings** of fed cattle during August totaled 2.07 million, virtually unchanged from 2006 but 2 percent above 2005. **Other disappearance** totaled 50,000 during August, 15 percent below 2006 and 6 percent below 2005.



## MILK PRODUCTION

**Kentucky** milk production for August 2007 totaled 97 million pounds, up 2 percent from August 2006, but down 5 percent from July 2007. Average number of cows, at 89,000 head, was 7,000 head below the previous year but unchanged from last month. Milk per cow, at 1,090 pounds during August, was up 100 pounds from a year ago, but down 60 pounds from last month.

Milk production in the **23 major States** during August totaled 14.3 billion pounds, up 3.6 percent from August 2006.

July revised production, at 14.5 billion pounds, was up 4.0 percent from July 2006. The July revision represented an increase of 10.0 million pounds or 0.1 percent from last month's preliminary production estimate. **Production per cow** in the 23 major States averaged 1,721 pounds for August, 45 pounds above August 2006. **The number of milk cows** on farms in the 23 major States was 8.33 million head, 72,000 head more than August 2006, and 11,000 head more than July 2007.

## RED MEAT PRODUCTION

### Commercial red meat production

for the U.S. totaled 4.33 billion pounds in August, up 2 percent from the 4.26 billion pounds produced in August 2006. August 2006 contained 23 weekdays and 4 Saturdays. August 2007 contained 23 weekdays and 4 Saturdays.

**Beef production**, at 2.45 billion pounds, was slightly above the previous year. Cattle slaughter totaled 3.13 million head, down slightly from August 2006. The average live weight was up 3 pounds from the previous year, at 1,279 pounds.

**Pork production** totaled 1.85 billion pounds, up 4 percent from the previous year. Hog kill totaled 9.39 million head, up 3 percent from August 2006. The average live weight was up 1 pound from the previous year, at 263 pounds.

## SMALL GRAINS

Farmers harvested 12.3 million bushels of **winter wheat** during the summer of 2007. The 2007 wheat crop was down 46 percent from the large 2006 crop of 22.7 million bushels and was the smallest crop in 16 years. The smaller winter wheat crop resulted from reduced harvested acreage and lower yield per acre. The smaller 2007 harvested acreage resulted from many farmers abandoning their winter wheat for grain acreage after experiencing devastating freezing temperatures in mid-April. After unseasonably warm temperatures in March and early April much of the crop was in the growth stage. Freezing temperatures left much of the crop unfit for harvest as grain. Farmers only harvested 250,000 acres for grain, 70,000 fewer acres than the 2006 crop. Yield was estimated at 49 bushels per acre, down 2 bushels from the July yield estimate and 22 bushels from last year's record high yield of 71 bushels per acre. Farmers seeded 440,000 acres in the fall of 2006 for the 2007 crop year, up 10,000 acres from previous year. The 190,000 acres not harvested for grain in 2007 was plowed down for a cover crop prior to setting tobacco, burned down with herbicides and replanted with corn or soybeans, cut as grain hay, chopped as green silage or abandoned. **All wheat** production for the **U.S.** totaled 2.07 billion

bushels in 2007, down 2 percent from the August forecast but up 14 percent from 2006. Grain area was 51.0 million acres, up 9 percent from last year. The yield was 40.5 bushels per acre, down 0.1 bushel from the last forecast but up 1.8 bushels from last year.

Production of **barley** totaled 105,000 bushels, the smallest barley production since 1928. The smaller production was due to a very low yield per acre and small harvested acreage. Yield at 35 bushels per acre was down 53 bushels from the 2006 record high yield of 88 bushels. Harvested acreage at 3,000 acres was down 11,000 from the 2006 crop. The mid-April freeze was especially hard on the barley crop as it was in the growth stage and matures earlier than wheat. For the 2007 barley crop, 7,000 acres were abandoned while in past years this averaged only 1,000 to 2,000 acres. Total acreage seeded for all purposes in 2007 was 10,000 acres. **U.S. barley** production was estimated at 211.8 million bushels, down 5 percent from the August forecast but up 18 percent from last year. Average yield per acre, at 60.4 bushels, was down 2.7 bushels from the previous forecast and 0.7 bushel below the 2006 yield. The area harvested for grain was estimated at 3.51 million acres, down 1 percent from August but 19 percent above a year ago.

## SEPTEMBER 1 GRAIN STOCKS

**Kentucky corn** stocks totaled 8.06 million bushels of old crop corn on September 1, 2007. Corn being harvested from the current 2007 crop was excluded from the stock's estimate. Total corn stocks for 2007 were up 7 percent from the September 1, 2006 estimate. Corn stored on farms totaled 3.60 million bushels, 3 percent above the September 2006 stocks. Corn stored off the farm totaled 4.46 million bushels, up 11 percent from September 2006. Off-farm stocks of corn made up 55 percent of the total corn stored in Kentucky. Off-farm stocks include grain stored at mills, elevators, warehouses, terminals and processors. Off-farm stocks of **wheat** totaled 7.30 million bushels, down 36 percent from a year earlier. This would be the smallest September wheat stocks in 10 years. **Soybeans** stored off-farm totaled 1.32 million bushels, down 4 percent from September 2006 and the smallest crop stored since 1999. In past years off-farm soybeans for September 1 were not published numerous times to avoid disclosure of individual operations. Off-farms stocks of **oats** totaled 170,000 bushels, an increase of 88,000 bushels from the previous year. **Barley and grain sorghum** stocks in off-farm facilities were not published to avoid disclosure of individual operations.

**U.S. corn** stocks in all positions on September 1, 2007 totaled 1.30 billion bushels, down 34 percent from September 1, 2006. Of the total stocks, 460.1 million bushels were stored on farms, down 39 percent from a year earlier. Off-farm stocks, at 843.7 million bushels, were down 31 percent from a year ago. The June-August 2007 indicated disappearance was 2.23 billion bushels, compared with 2.39 billion bushels during the same period last year. Old crop **soybeans** stored in all positions on September 1, 2007 totaled 572.8 million bushels, up 27 percent from September 1, 2006 and the largest September 1 stocks on record. Soybean stocks stored on farms totaled 143.0 million bushels, down 19 percent from a year ago. Off-farm stocks, at 429.8 million bushels, were up 57 percent from last September. Indicated disappearance for June-August 2007 totaled 519 million bushels, down 4 percent from the same period a year earlier. **All wheat** stored in all positions on September 1, 2007 totaled 1.72 billion bushels, down 2 percent from a year ago. On-farm stocks were estimated at 495.0 million bushels, down 13 percent from last September. Off-farm stocks, at 1.22 billion bushels, were up 4 percent from a year ago. The June-August 2007 indicated disappearance was 806 million bushels, up 27 percent from the same period a year earlier.
