## **Tennessee Crop Weather**

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For the Week Ending July 10, 2022

## HIT-OR-MISS SHOWERS BRING LITTLE RELIEF

In West Tennessee, widely scattered showers did little to alleviate dry conditions. All crops were in need of water. In Middle Tennessee, hot and dry conditions continued to prevail, causing stress to both crops and livestock. Corn was at an especially crucial stage and in need of moisture. Livestock producers were forced to start feeding hay, which is in short supply. In East Tennessee, more widespread rains brought some relief. The effects of the recent hot, dry weather were still being felt, however, with stress to pastures and fruit crops being reported. There were 6.1 days suitable for field work. Topsoil moisture was 21 percent very short, 43 percent short, 35 percent adequate, and 1 percent surplus. Subsoil moisture was 20 percent very short, 45 percent short, and 35 percent adequate.
