Tennessee Crop Weather

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For the Week Ending October 16, 2022

MUCH-NEEDED RAIN RECEIVED

In West Tennessee, widespread rains brought improved pasture conditions. Yields were looking good for all crops but corn. The pace of wheat planting picked up with the increased soil moisture. In Middle Tennessee, the rains came, but did little to alleviate the dry conditions that have prevailed over the last month. Farmers continued to delay winter wheat planting due to lack of soil moisture. In East Tennessee, rains were not as widespread. Corn and soybean harvest continued, with mixed results on yields. Wheat planting remained on hold as farmers waited for more rain. There were 5.7 days suitable for field work. Topsoil moisture was 13 percent very short, 45 percent short, and 42 percent adequate. Subsoil moisture was 12 percent very short, 47 percent short, and 41 percent adequate.
