


# ROANOKE COUNTY

2002 U.S. Census of Agriculture




Roanoke County is situated in south central Virginia and is bordered by the Blue Ridge Mountains on the east and south and the Allegheny Mountains on the west and north. Formed from part of Botetourt in 1838, the county is probably named after the Roanoke River, part of which flows through the county. Interestingly, "Roanoke" is an Indian term meaning "shell money."

Altitudes in the county range from about 900 feet above sea level in the valley to nearly 4,000 feet on the mountain peaks. Temperatures average 36 degrees in January and 75 in July. Annual precipitation averages 39 inches, with about 4 inches falling in each of the summer months and only 2.5 inches in November. The frost-free growing season lasts roughly 187 days. More than three-fifths of the county is wooded, and part of the Jefferson National Forest is located in the county.


