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

Weather Summary- For the week ending April 9, 2023

The week begins with West Virginia under high pressure. On Monday, a low-pressure system passed to the north of the State. As the low pressure passed, the State remained in the warm sector, with a warm front crossing over around midday. Temperatures were just above normal, and most locations were dry. Tuesday was warm and dry under high pressure. Wednesday began warm and dry ahead of the next cold front. The strong front crossed over from west to east in the afternoon/evening, but only brought limited precipitation and breezy winds. Temperatures dropped to below normal after the cold front, and some lingering showers remained in the southern coalfields and Eastern Panhandle for Thursday. Friday was cool and clear for most locations, but precipitation remained in the southeastern most counties as the front slowly drifted off to the east. High pressure took hold again over the weekend with warm afternoons and chilly mornings. Temperatures dropped enough to create some frost over the weekend as well. Overall, the week was dry and somewhat warm even though overnight temperatures dropped to below freezing. All temperatures were from normal to eight degrees above average.

<u>Temperatures</u>: Clarksburg, Williamson, Charleston, and Keyser had the highest recorded temperature of 89 degrees. Beckley and Moorefield had the lowest recorded temperature of 22 degrees. The state average temperature was 53 degrees.

<u>Precipitation:</u> Bluestone Dam had the highest recorded amount of precipitation with 0.76 inches. Martinsburg had the lowest with zero recorded precipitation. The state average precipitation was 0.23 inches.

WV drought conditions: Abnormally dry conditions exist in the Eastern Panhandle.
