IMPORTANT MID-YEAR SURVEY

South Dakota
Agricultural
Statistics Service

South Dakota farmers and ranchers will be asked to participate in a nationwide survey starting the end of May and continuing through the first two weeks of June. Conducted locally by USDA's South Dakota Agricultural Statistics Service, the purpose is to obtain crop acreages, grain stored, and hog numbers.

All individual information is confidential and used only in developing official national and state estimates. Producers will be interviewed, either by telephone or personally, with cooperation necessary to provide reliable estimates. Results will provide farmers and ranchers, business firms, policy makers, and other data users with information helpful in planning future activities.

SOUTH DAKOTA: South Dakota's 1,000+ capacity feedlots reported 215,000 **cattle on feed** for the slaughter market on May 1. The May 1 number is unchanged from a month earlier but up 35,000 head from a year ago.

with capacity of 1,000 or more head totaled 11.17 million head on May 1, 2001. The inventory was 2 percent above May 1, 2000, and 11 percent above May 1, 1999.

Placements during April totaled 27,000 head, down 16,000 head from March but up 11,000 head from last year.

Placements in feedlots during April totaled 1.55 million, 9 percent below 2000 and 8 percent below 1999. Net placements were 1.46 million. During April, placements of cattle and calves weighing less than 600 pounds were 334,000, 600-699 pounds were 384,000, 700-799 pounds were 494,000, and 800 pounds and greater were 339,000.

Marketings of fed cattle during April totaled 25,000 head, down 7,000 head from March and down 8,000 head from last year.

Marketings of fed cattle during April totaled 1.82 million, 3 percent below 2000 and 7 percent below 1999.

Other disappearance during April totaled 2,000 head, down 1,000 head from March and down 1,000 head from a year earlier.

Other disappearance totaled 89,000 during April, 1 percent below 2000 and 14 percent below 1999.

MEAT ANIMALS PRODUCTION, DISPOSITION, AND INCOME

SOUTH DAKOTA: The 2000 cash receipts from cattle and calves, hogs and pigs, and sheep and lambs for South Dakota totaled \$1,721.9 million, up 14 percent from 1999. Cattle and calves accounted for 82 percent of the total, hogs and pigs for 16 percent, and sheep and lambs for 2 percent. Cash receipts increased in 2000 for cattle and calves, hogs and pigs, and sheep and lambs. Gross income from meat animals (which includes value of home consumption) in South Dakota during 2000 totaled \$1,734.1 million, up 14 percent from 1999.

Cattle and Calves: South Dakota cash receipts from marketings of cattle and calves increased 10 percent from \$1,281.3 million in 1999 to \$1,410.6 million in 2000. Higher cash receipts were credited to higher prices. The South Dakota annual average price per 100 pounds live weight for cattle in 2000 was \$75.50, compared with \$69.00 for 1999, while the calf price was \$108.00, compared with \$92.00 in 1999.

Hogs and Pigs: South Dakota cash receipts from hog and pig marketings in 2000 totaled \$283.5 million, up 40 percent from the \$202.6 million in 1999. Higher average prices and higher marketings increased cash receipts. The annual average price for all hogs increased from \$31.30 in 1999 to \$43.40 in 2000, while marketings increased from 2,737,000 head in 1999 to 2,872,000 head in 2000.

Sheep and Lambs: South Dakota cash receipts from marketings of sheep and lambs in 2000 were \$27.8 million, up 1 percent from \$27.6 million in 1999. Higher prices contributed to higher cash receipts. The annual average price for sheep increased from \$30.40 in 1999 to \$33.30 in 2000, and lamb prices increased from \$79.70 in 1999 to \$88.20 in 2000. Marketings of sheep during 2000 increased and offset a small decrease in lamb marketings.

UNITED STATES: The 2000 gross income from cattle and calves, hogs and pigs, and sheep and lambs for the U.S. totaled \$53.4 billion, up 16 percent from 1999. Gross income rose for all three species. Hogs and pigs increased the most, at 36 percent, cattle and calves increased 12 percent, and sheep and lambs increased slightly from the previous year.

Total 2000 cash receipts from marketings of meat animals increased 16 percent to \$53.0 billion. Cattle and calves accounted for 77 percent of this total, hogs and pigs 22 percent, and sheep and lambs 1 percent. Production increased for cattle and calves, but declined for both hogs and pigs and sheep and lambs. Average prices were up from 1999 levels for all three species.
