




Located in the central part of the Great Valley of Virginia, Botetourt County was formed in 1770 from Augusta and named in honor of Lord Botetourt, governor of the colonies in 1768. The county is bordered by the Blue Ridge Mountains on the east and the Alleghany Mountains on the west.

The topography of the county varies widely. The central part of Botetourt consists of a rolling, hilly valley with an average elevation of 1,000 feet. In the eastern and western parts are rugged mountains with elevations up to 3,700 feet. As the county includes a full 253,975 acres of woodland, much of this land is forested and unsuited for farming. The Jefferson and George Washington National Forests include 69,790 acres of woods and the Blue Ridge Parkway 1,306 acres, with the remainder in other public lands that include part of the Roanoke watershed.




