




Nansemond County was changed to the City of Nansemond on July 1, 1972. Effective January 1, 1974, the City of Suffolk merged with the City of Nansemond to form the City of Suffolk.

The topography of Suffolk ranges from gently rolling, undulating areas to broad, flat, almost level areas. Much of the eastern border of the city is in the Dismal Swamp. Suffolk has one of the heaviest rainfall averages in the state, with an average annual precipitation of 47 inches. The climate is generally mild, as temperatures average a moderate 40 degrees in January and 78 in July. The frost-free growing season averages 208 days, usually extending between April 9 and November 3.

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


