
Warren County is located in the northern part of the Shenandoah Valley between the Blue Ridge Mountains on the east and the Massanutten on the west. Formed in 1837 from parts of Frederick and Shenandoah, Warren is one of eleven Virginia counties named for American patriots. The county is named in honor of General Joseph Warren, a leader who fought at Lexington, died at Bunker Hill, and under whose orders Paul Revere set forth on his famous midnight ride to Lexington.

With the exception of areas along the Shenandoah River, the topography of the county is rolling and mountainous. More than half of Warren is wooded, and parts of the Shenandoah National Park and the George Washington National Forest are located in the county. Elevations vary from 400 to 3,400 feet above sea level, and temperatures average 35 degrees in January and 76 in July. Total precipitation averages about 35 inches annually.


