CALIFORNIA PROSPECTIVE PLANTINGS REPORT

SACRAMENTO -- The USDA-NASS, California Field Office today released the forecasts of field crop plantings for 2011. These forecasts, of acreage planted and to be planted, are based on a survey of more than 2,500 California farmers, conducted the first two weeks of March. The impact of weather and/or market conditions since the survey began is not reflected in this report.

Barley - California farmers had planted or intended to plant 150 thousand acres of barley, up 36 percent from the previous year.

Beans, Dry Edible - Seeding of dry edible beans was planned for 50.0 thousand acres in California, down 21 percent from last year.

Corn - California farmers were expecting to plant 640 thousand acres of corn for all purposes in 2011, a 5 percent increase from last year.

Cotton - California farmers were intending to plant 160 thousand acres of Upland cotton in 2011, up 29 percent from the acreage seeded in 2010. In addition, growers were expecting to seed 225 thousand acres of American Pima cotton in 2011, up 24 percent from last year.

Hay, All - California producers intended to harvest hay from 1.40 million acres, down 5 percent from last year.

Oats - Farmers in California had planted or were expecting to plant 210 thousand acres of oats, 5 percent less than in 2010.

Rice - California farmers intended to seed rice on 575 thousand acres, 3 percent above the acreage seeded in 2010. The expressed intentions were to seed 530 thousand acres of medium grain varieties, 4 percent above last year. The long grain rice acreage forecast is 5.0 thousand acres, down 17 percent from last season. The short grain rice planted acreage forecast is 40.0 thousand acres, down 5 percent from last season. Short grain and all rice forecasts include the intended plantings of sweet rice.

Sugar Beets - California producers had planted or intended to plant 25.0 thousand acres of sugar beets, down less than 1 percent from the acreage seeded in 2010.

Sunflower – California farmers were expecting to plant 17.0 thousand acres of sunflowers for oil, down 37 percent from last year, and 11.0 thousand acres of non-oil sunflowers, up 57 percent from 2010.

Sweet Potatoes - California farmers were expecting to plant 19.5 thousand acres of sweet potatoes in 2011, up 8 percent from last year.

Wheat - Acreage seeded to Winter wheat is forecast at 760 thousand acres, 15 percent above last year. Another 155 thousand acres have been seeded to Durum wheat, 35 percent above the amount planted in 2010.

The next production forecast will be issued April 8, 2011.
