According to the National Agricultural Statistics Service in Mississippi, there were 6.6 days suitable for fieldwork for the **week ending Sunday, October 8, 2017**. Topsoil moisture supplies were 9 percent very short, 39 percent short, 50 percent adequate, and 2 percent surplus. Subsoil moisture supplies were 8 percent very short, 31 percent short, 59 percent adequate, and 2 percent surplus. Low temperatures ranged from 56.0 degrees Fahrenheit at Corinth to 69.3 degrees Fahrenheit at Biloxi. Highs ranged from 80.0 degrees Fahrenheit at Clarksdale, Kosciusko, and Poplarville to 88.2 degrees Fahrenheit at Columbus. Most of the state received some rain, with the highest concentration in the coastal part of the state with an average of 1.25 inches.
