Excellent Week for Field Work: New Jersey had an average of 6.5 days suitable for field work. Mean temperatures reported from stations across the state were almost all a little below normal. The majority of temperatures were reported as ranging between lows in the 30's and 40's up to highs in the high 60's and low 70's.

Most stations reported about a half an inch of rain for the week. Some reported none to a trace. Halloween and other fall agri-tourism events are in full swing, however the wet weekend in many areas significantly reduced attendance. On a positive note, there is plenty of moisture in the ground. Harvest is mostly completed for orchard crops, but this will help in keeping the plants healthy and accumulate storage nutrients before the leaf fall, which is beginning to occur.

Overall harvest conditions are good as fall vegetable crop and orchard harvests continue. Some counties are fortunate to have no reports of bitter-pit during storage, as seen in other Northeast regions. Growers tuning up equipment and tools, such as draining irrigation lines, etc. Some growers are pushing out old varieties of nectarines and peaches and replanting with new varieties. Some are treating with Vapam, a powerful soil fumigant to control nematodes before planting. Late red varieties of wine grapes being harvested and crushed. In one county they are investigating a report of spotted lanternfly. The pumpkin crop is light in weight and high in quality.
