




# SOUTH CAROLINA CROP SUMMARY

2004

**JANUARY:** The month began with warm, spring-like temperatures and mostly dry conditions. By the end of the third week temperatures plummeted as a sharp cold front moved south and dropped a mixture of snow, sleet and freezing rain from the midlands into the upstate area. Ice accumulations caused power disruptions to as many as 300,000 residents and roadway travel became nearly impossible. Despite the sleet and freezing rain, the month was dry overall. Land preparations were underway where weather permitted, and the cold caused little damage to developing small grain crops.

**FEBRUARY:** Cold days and mostly cloudy skies lasted through most of February with sleet, freezing rains and light snow showers reported mid-month throughout the State. The last week of the month, York county reported a snow event total of 22 inches. This was the State's third highest 24-hour snowfall on record. Temperatures remained below normal throughout the month, and delayed development of small grains and early plantings. Growers were busy caring for livestock and attending agricultural seminars.

**MARCH:** March came in like a lamb with springlike temperatures and temperatures as high as 80 degrees. Bulbs began flowering in the warm temperatures, but by the end of the first week a strong cold front with winds gusting between 40 and 60 mph moved through the State. There were reports of downed trees, power disruptions, and light property damage. Conditions returned to normal as the month progressed. The first full week of Spring began with cool, dry weather and ended with warm temperatures. Flowering accelerated due to the warmth while pollen counts peaked. The ongoing dry conditions delayed some counties' progress in field work. Livestock was in mostly good condition, but pastures needed rain as did dry fields.

**APRIL:** The month began with cool temperatures but ended with much needed heavy rain showers and warmer temperatures. Development of small grains lagged behind normal during the early part of April, but planting of field crops and vegetables moved at a rapid pace as the month drew to a close. Most crops were ahead of schedule by month's end and in fair to good condition despite the lack of moisture. Tobacco transplanting was more than 30 percent ahead of the previous year. Soil moisture was 6% very short, 40% short, 50% adequate and 4% surplus at the end of the month and 26 days were suitable for field work.

**MAY:** The month began on a warm note and ended on a hot one. The warm temperatures sparked afternoon showers throughout much of the month, but coverage was sporadic leaving most areas short of precipitation and causing problems for shallow rooted crops like soybeans. Cotton planting was also slowed due to the dry conditions and most crops were only in fair condition by month's end. Soil moisture was 18% very short, 48% short, and 34% adequate at the end of the month, while almost 26 days were suitable for field work.

**JUNE:** Hot, dry weather dominated the beginning of the month. By mid-month, heavy showers moved into the State and brought some relief from the long dry spell. Showers continued throughout the month. At least one tornado touched down in Beaufort county and during the last week torrential rains caused some field crop deterioration in flooded areas. At month's end, corn was showing a slight improvement due to the rain. Both cotton and soybeans were in fair to mostly good condition as the month ended as were pastures and livestock. Small grains were ripening rapidly and were in fair to good shape. Soil moisture was 3% very short, 23% short, 63% adequate and 11% surplus with 24 days suitable for field work.

**JULY:** July began with numerous thunderstorms and torrential rains which continued into the second week. Although the rain was beneficial to most areas, there were reports of wind and hail damage to tobacco in both Darlington and Florence counties. In other drier areas of the State, it was feared corn would not recover from

the lack of rain. Nearly all phases of field crop development continued ahead of the normal pace, and crops were in surprisingly good shape considering the weather related stress they had suffered. The State's peach crop was reported in good to excellent condition. Corn had almost finished doughing. Two-thirds of the cotton crop had set bolls and one-third of the soybeans had set pods by month's end. Almost one-half of the tobacco crop had been harvested and small grain harvesting was complete. Pastures were in fair to good condition and livestock remained in good shape. Soil moisture was 3% very short, 18% short, 73% adequate and 6% surplus at the end of July while about 25 days were suitable for field work.

**AUGUST:** The State was drenched by four tropical systems during the month. Alex, Bonnie, Charley and Gaston brought torrential rains to many parts of the area. Charley brought as much as fourteen inches of rain to areas in Georgetown county and caused damage to both tobacco and cotton crops there. However, most areas did not report widespread crop damage, and the rain brought relief to many parched fields. By month's end, soybeans started dropping leaves and twenty percent of cotton had open bolls with both crops in good shape. Even corn was in fair to good shape after the long hot summer. Tobacco took the biggest hit from the storms in the low country and remained in fair to good condition overall. Both pastures and livestock were in good condition at month's end and growers began planting winter grazings. Soil moisture at the end of August was 2% very short, 21% short, 51% adequate, and 26% surplus while 22 days were suitable for field work.

**SEPTEMBER:** After a stormy August, Hurricane Frances loomed off the coast of South Carolina. Some parts of Darlington and Marlboro counties reported as much as ten inches of rain from this tropical system. As the remnants of Frances moved into the State, many rivers were at or above flood stage and some evacuations took place in Florence county. The second week Ivan moved near the upstate and heavy rains slowed both planting and harvesting in those areas. The last week of the month tropical depression Jeanne moved into the State spawning several tornadoes and adding more moisture to already waterlogged fields. Crop damage from these tropical storms was mostly confined to the low country counties where open cotton bolls and early maturing soybeans were hardest hit. Most group IV soybeans in those counties were rotten. Despite the wet conditions corn harvesting was mostly complete by month's end, and the soybean crop remained in mostly good condition overall. Small grains planting had begun by the end of the month and both pastures and livestock remained in mostly good condition. Soil moisture was 4% very short, 1% short, 67% adequate, and 28% surplus at month's end while only 19 days were suitable for field work.

**OCTOBER:** Favorable weather finally returned to the Palmetto State. High pressure lasted most of the month. Cotton and soybeans harvesting progressed at a rapid pace as the good weather held over most of the area. By month's end, most field crops remained in good condition, and though many group IV soybeans in the low country were damaged by the excessive moisture during August, the outlook was somewhat brighter for later maturing beans. Farmers moved quickly to get their small grains and winter grazing crops into the ground. The sweet potato crop seemed to have suffered the most damage and was reported to in only poor to fair shape. Most of the tobacco stalks had been plowed under by the last week of the month. Livestock and pastures remained in good condition. Soil moisture for the end of the month was 1% very short, 12% short, 86% adequate and 1% surplus. There were approximately 24 days suitable for field work.

**NOVEMBER:** November began with warm temperatures and mostly clear skies. The lack of showers, however, caused delayed small grain planting in a few counties. During the second week, the Upstate received a scattering of frost which caused some minor crop damage, while in other areas, rain caused delays in cotton and soybean harvesting. Cotton, soybeans and peanuts remained in mostly good condition throughout the State. Small grain planting neared completion and those crops were also in mostly good shape. The continuing showers during the last half of the month, helped pastures, winter grazing and livestock thrive. By month's end soil moisture was 3% very short, 11% short, 74% adequate and 12% surplus. Twenty-two days of the month were suitable for field work.

**DECEMBER:** The month began with spring-like temperatures and ended with a cold front which spread sleet, light snow and freezing rain over the lower central and coastal areas of the State. Farmers tended livestock and winter grazing. Some early land preparations were taking place around the area. Small grains remained in mostly good condition.



## GRAIN STORAGE CAPACITY Off-Farm and On Farm

Capacity of **Off-Farm** commercial grain storage totaled 22.2 million bushels in SOUTH CAROLINA on December 1, 2004, less than 1 percent below December 1, 2003. With this capacity, South Carolina ranks 33<sup>rd</sup> in the United States.

Off-farm grain storage facilities in South Carolina totaled 78 on December 1, 2004, down 1 from December 1, 2003.

## **NURSERY, FLORICULTURE, HORTICULTURE AND TURFGRASS**

### **FLORICULTURE**

Total crop value of all floriculture crops for all South Carolina growers with \$10,000 or more in sales in 2004 was estimated at \$113 million, up 3 percent compared to \$110 million in 2003. There were 111 growers in 2004, down from 121 in 2003. Total covered area for floriculture crop production was recorded at 7.37 million square feet, up from 7.0 million square feet in 2003. Total greenhouse space covered area at 4.81 million square feet was up from 2003's 4.58 million square feet.

Growers with \$100,000 plus in total sales posted a wholesale value of plant production during 2004 of \$104.9 million, up from \$103.0 in 2003. The wholesale value of bedding and garden plants, the largest part of production, totaled \$88.5 million, up from \$86.5 in 2003.

## FARM NUMBERS AND LAND IN FARMS

The number of farms in SOUTH CAROLINA in 2004 is estimated at 24,400, unchanged from 2003 and down 100 from the 24,500 in 2002. Total land in farms for 2004 is 4.85 million acres, unchanged from 2003 and 2002. The average size of farms in 2004 was 199 acres, unchanged from 2003 but up 1 acre from 2002. Farms with \$100,000 or more in sales totaled 1,800 in 2004, accounting for 7.4 percent of all farms and an increase of 100 farms from 2003.

The number of farms in the UNITED STATES in 2004 is estimated at 2.11 million, 0.6 percent fewer than in 2003. Total land in farms, at 936.6 million acres, decreased 2.25 million acres, or 0.2 percent, from 2003. The average farm size was 443 acres in 2004, an increase of 2 acres from the previous year. The decline in the number of farms and land in farms reflects a continuing consolidation in farming operations and transfers of agricultural land to competing uses.

A **farm** is defined as "any establishment from which \$1,000 or more of agricultural products were sold or normally would be sold during the year." Government payments are included in sales. Institutional farms experimental and research farms, and Indian Reservations are included as farms. Places with their entire acreage enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program, set aside, or other government programs are considered operating farms if they receive \$1,000 or more in payments. Operations with 5 or more horses or ponies and no other agricultural sales also counted as farms. Operations with fewer than 5 equine and at least \$1,000 in agricultural sales qualified as farms.

**Land in farms** is all land operated by farms during the year. It includes crop and livestock acreage, wasteland, woodland, pasture, land in summer fallow, idle cropland, and land enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program and other set aside or commodity acreage programs. It excludes all public, industrial, and grazing association land. It excludes all land operated by establishments not qualifying as farms.

# LIVESTOCK INVENTORY

## ALL CATTLE AND CALVES

The South Carolina cattle industry had a total of 435,000 cattle and calves as of January 1, 2005 with 10,000 cattle farms. There was a total of 222,000 beef cows and 18,000 milk cows in the inventory.

The 2004 calf crop totaled 195,000 head, up 3 percent from 2003 and 2002. The calving rate for these

years was 82.1 percent for 2004 and 81.7 percent for 2003.

South Carolina ranked 38<sup>th</sup> in the Nation for all cattle and calves, with Texas ranked 1<sup>st</sup>, Kansas ranked 2<sup>nd</sup>, Nebraska ranked 3<sup>rd</sup>, with California and Oklahoma ranked 4<sup>th</sup>. The leading county in South Carolina was Anderson followed by Saluda, Newberry, Laurens and Spartanburg.

## MILK PRODUCTION

There were an estimated 200 farms with one or more dairy cows in South Carolina during 2004 with an average 17,000 milk cows which produced 287 million pounds of milk. In 2003, the State had 210 farms with an average of 19,000 milk cows that produced 318 million pounds of milk. South Carolina ranked 40<sup>th</sup> in the Nation for average milk cows, California ranked 1<sup>st</sup>, Wisconsin 2<sup>nd</sup> and New York 3<sup>rd</sup>. Newberry was the leading county with 4,000 milk cows, followed by Orangeburg, Spartanburg, and Bamberg.

The 2004 milk production was 10 percent below 2003 and 21 percent below 2002. The

annual average milk per cow at 16,882 pounds compared with 16,737 pounds in 2003 and 18,200 pounds in 2002. Farm value of milk produced, which includes value of fluid milk and cream consumed in farm households, milk used for farm-churned butter, milk fed to calves, as well as marketings of milk and cream totaled \$49,416,000 in 2004 compared with \$42,840,000 in 2003, and \$48,735,000 in 2002. The average price of milk in 2004 was \$17.40 per cwt. compared with \$13.60 in 2003, and \$13.50 in 2002.

## EGG PRODUCTION

SOUTH CAROLINA egg production in 2004 totaled 1.35 billion eggs. This was 2 percent below the 1.37 billion eggs produced in 2003 and 2 percent below the 1.38 produced in 2002.

The average number of layers on hand during 2004 was 5,243,000, down 2 percent from the 5,325,000 on hand in 2003 and 2 percent below 2002's 5,372,000 layers.

The annual average rate of lay per layer (including breeders) was 258 eggs in 2004 and in 2003, and 257 in 2002.

South Carolina ranked 17<sup>th</sup> in the nation for egg production in 2004 with Iowa 1<sup>st</sup>, Georgia 6<sup>th</sup>, and North Carolina 12<sup>th</sup>. Within the State, Kershaw County ranked 1<sup>st</sup> followed by Newberry, Darlington, Saluda, and Lexington counties.

## BROILERS RAISED

SOUTH CAROLINA broiler producers raised 204,500,000 broilers in 2004. This was 4 percent more than 2003 and 6 percent more than 2002. Pounds produced totaled 1,186,100,000 in 2004, up 4 percent from 2003. The average price received for broilers in 2004 was 44.0 cents per pound liveweight equivalent, up 10.0 cents from 2003, and up 14.0 cents from 2002. Value of production, which includes home consumption, was \$521,884,000, up 34

percent from 2003's \$389,266,000 and 61 percent above 2002's \$324,060,000.

On a county wide basis during 2004, Lexington, Oconee, Aiken, Saluda, and Sumter, were the leading broiler-producing counties in the State. South Carolina ranks 12<sup>th</sup> in the Nation with Georgia holding the top spot and Arkansas placing 2<sup>nd</sup>, Alabama 3<sup>rd</sup>, Mississippi 4<sup>th</sup>, and North Carolina 5<sup>th</sup>.

## TURKEYS RAISED

Turkeys raised in SOUTH CAROLINA during 2004 totaled 12,000,000 birds, unchanged from the 12,000,000 birds raised in 2003, and up 21 percent from the 9,900,000 raised in 2002.

Value of production was \$185,280,000 during 2004, 16 percent above 2003, and 36 percent above 2002. During 2004 the average price received was 40.0 cents per pound, up 5 cents from 2003 and 3 cents above 2002.

# SOUTH CAROLINA

## CASH RECEIPTS

Preliminary cash receipts from farm marketings in South Carolina during 2004, including government payments, totaled \$1,990,397,000. The \$2.0 billion is 12 percent (\$206 million) above 2003 and 32 percent (\$478 million) above 2002. Government payments for 2004 of \$81 million, were 37 percent below 2003, but 23 percent above 2002. The number one commodity in terms of cash receipts during 2004 was broilers, accounting for 27 percent of the total, excluding government payments.

CROPS cash receipts, at \$833 million, accounted for 44 percent of the total commodity cash receipts during 2004 compared with 47 percent in 2003 and 2002. Preliminary 2004 crops cash receipts increased \$51 million (6 percent) from 2003 and were \$147 million (21 percent) above 2002. Greenhouse, nursery & floriculture, tobacco and soybeans were the top three crop commodities in 2004 in terms of cash receipts.

LIVESTOCK AND LIVESTOCK PRODUCTS, with cash receipts of \$1,076 million in 2004, accounted for 56 percent of the commodity total compared to 53 percent in 2003 and 2002. Livestock receipts increased 23 percent (\$204 million) from 2003 and were 42 percent (\$316 million) above 2002. Broilers, turkeys, and cattle and calves were the top three commodities.
