

South Carolina "Top 10"

South Carolina agriculture is truly diverse. This year we are highlighting this diversity by showing pictures on the cover of the 'top 10' commodities produced in South Carolina. Among the 'top 10' commodities grown in the State are broilers; floriculture, nursery, and greenhouse crops; cattle and calves; turkeys; cotton lint and seed; soybeans; eggs; tobacco; hogs; and corn. In addition, South Carolina ranks among the 'top 10' producing states in the U.S. for tomatoes, peaches, watermelons, flue-cured tobacco, and turkeys.

This bulletin is a cooperative effort between the National Agricultural Statistics Service of the United States Department of Agriculture and the Department of Applied Economics and Statistics, Public Service and Agriculture of Clemson University. This cooperative relationship increases the amount of information available about agriculture. The Federal program provides the comparable statistics for all states, which are released in national reports, while state funds make it possible to prepare and publish detailed statistics for South Carolina.

Accurate agricultural statistics are crucial to an orderly marketplace and we thank everyone who provides us with this important information. My sincere appreciation goes to my entire staff for their efforts in preparing accurate and timely statistics for South Carolina agriculture.

SOUTH CAROLINA CROP SUMMARY

2005

JANUARY: The month began with warm, spring-like temperatures that averaged statewide to twelve degrees above normal. By the end of the fourth week, however, temperatures plummeted to eight degrees below normal as a sharp cold front moved south and produced snow showers across Florence County and the Pee Dee. Ice accumulations caused isolated power interruptions as well as some transportation delays at the month's end. Despite the snow, sleet and freezing rain, the month was dry overall. Land preparations were underway where weather permitted, and the cold caused little damage to developing small grain crops.

FEBRUARY: After a cold beginning week of February, mild temperatures and scarce rainfall persisted throughout the rest of the month. By month's end, many areas in the State were as much as 4 inches behind the normal YTD precipitation. Dry conditions delayed development of small grains and early plantings. Growers were busy caring for livestock and attending agricultural seminars.

MARCH: March came in with gale force winds and damaging high tides for the central and southern coast, along with temperatures that were six degrees below normal for the period. By the second week, temperatures climbed to within one degree of normal, but they brought with them damaging winds that varied between 25 and 50 mph. Conditions returned to normal as the month progressed. The first full week of Spring began with warm weather and widespread rainfall. The State averaged four inches of rain over the final two weeks of the month. Livestock was in mostly good condition, while pastures and fields received some relief from the dry conditions of the previous two months.

APRIL: April began much the same way as March ended as thunderstorms popped up throughout the first couple of weeks. As a result, development of small grains lagged behind during the early part of April, and planting of most field crops and vegetables were significantly behind both the previous year and the 5-year average. Soil moisture was 17% short, 77% adequate and 6% surplus at the end of the month and 24 days were suitable for field work.

MAY: Crop development was hampered the first two weeks of the month as unseasonably cool temperatures were observed throughout the State along with some intense storms. York County reported hail that was two and one half inches deep across the area. By mid-month, however, crop progress had returned to normal levels due to a warming trend and adequate precipitation. All major crops were at or near normal progress by month's end. Soil moisture was 3% very short, 22% short, 71% adequate and 4% surplus at the end of the month, and 29 days were suitable for field work.

JUNE: June began with a soaking rain, as the State averaged rainfall of 3.1 inches the first week of the month. The second week was similar as wet weather delayed field activities including harvesting and spraying. Temperatures rose and the rain dried up quickly, however, and farmer's were able to return to their fields to harvest wheat and plant soybeans at mid-month. By month's end, corn, cotton, soybeans and tobacco were all in fair to mostly good condition as well as pastures and livestock. Small grains were ripening rapidly and were in fair to good shape. Soil moisture was 3% very short, 21% short, 68% adequate and 8% surplus with 21 days suitable for field work.

JULY: July began with numerous thunderstorms and torrential rains caused by Tropical Depression Cindy and remnants of Hurricane Dennis. Although the rain was beneficial to some areas, there were widespread reports of wind,

hail, and flood damage. Crops in low-lying fields were hit especially hard by the flooding. The storms were followed by intense heat, as both Darlington and Myrtle Beach reported temperatures well in excess of 100 degrees the last week in July. By month's end, nearly all phases of field crop development were behind the previous year and generally behind normal progress levels as well. However, ninety-two percent of the State's peach crop was reported in good condition with the remainder split between fair and excellent. Pastures and livestock were in mostly good condition. Soil moisture was 4% very short, 21% short, 66% adequate and 9% surplus at the end of July while 24 days were suitable for field work.

AUGUST: Hot, humid weather was prevalent throughout August as crops and livestock for the most part received timely rainfall for the month. By month's end, soybeans started dropping leaves and twenty percent of cotton had open bolls with both crops in good shape. Corn was in fair to good shape after the long hot summer. Tobacco was adversely affected by all of the wet weather and was mainly in fair to good condition, with some being classified as poor as well as excellent. Both pastures and livestock were in good condition at month's end and growers began planting winter grazings. Soil moisture at the end of August was 1% very short, 11% short, 84% adequate and 4% surplus while 26 days were suitable for field work.

SEPTEMBER: While August had timely rainfall, September for the most part did not experience any measurable widespread rainfall. By the end of the month, rainfall totals of 0.01 inches at Florence and no rain in Columbia both set records. Yield potential was severely compromised, and small grain plantings were well behind because of the significantly dry conditions. Livestock remained in mostly good condition, but pastures were notably in worse shape, ranging from very poor to fair, with only 15% considered to be good. Soil moisture was 57% very short, 28% short and 15% adequate. There were approximately 29 days suitable for field work.

OCTOBER: After an abnormally dry September, October brought with it much-needed rain showers for the first half of the month and ended with excellent harvesting conditions. Many feared that the rain came too late, however, as yields fluctuated greatly from field to field. By month's end, most field crops could be found in the fair to good range. Farmers moved quickly once the flooding rains stopped to get their small grains and winter grazing crops into the ground. All of the tobacco stalks had been plowed under by the last week of the month. Livestock remained in mostly good condition, while pastures had shown some slight improvement from the previous month. Soil moisture was 2% very short, 35% short, 63% adequate. There were approximately 25 days suitable for field work.

NOVEMBER: November began with warm, dry temperatures and mostly clear skies that were excellent for harvesting activities. The lack of showers, however, delayed small grain planting in a few counties. The soybean crop's condition continued to deteriorate with each week of no rainfall. Cotton and peanuts remained in mostly good condition throughout the State. Small grain planting still lagged behind at month's end. The sporadic showers during the last half of the month provided some relief to pastures, winter grazing and livestock. By month's end soil moisture was 15% very short, 31% short and 54% adequate. There were 25 days suitable for field work.

DECEMBER: The month began and ended with spring-like temperatures, as afternoon high temperatures on New Years Day approached 70 degrees. Measurable rainfall was observed the second week in December. For the remainder of the month, farmers tended livestock and winter grazing. Some early land preparations were taking place around the state. Small grains remained in mostly good condition.



GRAIN STORAGE CAPACITY Off-Farm and On Farm

Capacity of **Off-Farm** commercial grain storage totaled 20.3 million bushels in SOUTH CAROLINA on December 1, 2005, 9 percent below December 1, 2004. With this capacity, South Carolina ranks 34th in the United States.

Off-farm grain storage facilities in South Carolina totaled 74 on December 1, 2005, down 4 from December 1, 2004.

NURSERY, FLORICULTURE, HORTICULTURE AND TURFGRASS

FLORICULTURE

Total crop value of all floriculture crops for all South Carolina growers with \$10,000 or more in sales in 2005 was estimated at \$106 million, down 6 percent compared to \$113 million in 2004. There were 103 growers in 2005, down from 111 in 2004. Total covered area for floriculture crop production was recorded at 9.46 million square feet, down from 9.76 million square feet in 2004. Total greenhouse space covered area at 6.96 million square feet was down from 2004's 7.20 million square feet.

Growers with \$100,000 plus in total sales posted a wholesale value of plant production during 2005 of \$93.3 million, down from \$103.5 million in 2004. The wholesale value of bedding and garden plants, the largest part of production, totaled \$77.5 million, down from \$88.2 million in 2004.

FARM NUMBERS AND LAND IN FARMS

The number of farms in SOUTH CAROLINA in 2005 is estimated at 24,300, down 100 from the 24,400 in 2004 and 2003. Total land in farms for 2005 is 4.84 million acres, down 10,000 acres from 2004 and 2003. The average size of farms in 2005 was 199 acres, unchanged from 2004 and 2003. Farms with \$100,000 or more in sales totaled 1,800 in 2005, accounting for 7.4 percent of all farms and no change from 2004.

The number of farms in the UNITED STATES in 2005 is estimated at 2.1 million, 0.6 percent fewer than in 2004. Total land in farms, at 933.4 million acres, decreased 2.9 million acres, or .03 percent, from 2004. The average farm size was 444 acres in 2005, an increase of one acre from the previous year. The decline in the number of farms and land in farms reflects a continuing consolidation in farming operations and diversion of agricultural land to nonagricultural uses.

A **farm** is defined as "any establishment from which \$1,000 or more of agricultural products were sold or normally would be sold during the year." Government payments are included in sales. Institutional farms experimental and research farms, and Indian Reservations are included as farms. Places with their entire acreage enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program, set aside, or other government programs are considered operating farms if they receive \$1,000 or more in payments. Operations with 5 or more horses or ponies and no other agricultural sales also counted as farms. Operations with fewer than 5 equine and at least \$1,000 in agricultural sales qualified as farms.

Land in farms is all land operated by farms during the year. It includes crop and livestock acreage, wasteland, woodland, pasture, land in summer fallow, idle cropland, and land enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program and other set aside or commodity acreage programs. It excludes all public, industrial, and grazing association land. It excludes all land operated by establishments not qualifying as farms.

LIVESTOCK INVENTORY

ALL CATTLE AND CALVES

The South Carolina cattle industry had a total of 415,000 cattle and calves as of January 1, 2006 with 10,000 cattle farms. There was a total of 213,000 beef cows and 17,000 milk cows in the inventory.

The 2005 calf crop totaled 185,000 head, down 5 percent from 2004 and 3 percent from 2003. The calving rate for these years was 78.7 percent for 2005 and 82.1

percent for 2004. South Carolina ranked 38th in the Nation for all cattle and calves, with Texas ranked 1st, Kansas ranked 2nd, Nebraska ranked 3rd, and California ranked 4th. The leading county in South Carolina was Anderson, followed by Newberry, Laurens, Saluda and Spartanburg.

MILK PRODUCTION

There were an estimated 200 farms with one or more dairy cows in South Carolina during 2005 with an average 18,000 milk cows which produced 290 million pounds of milk. In 2004, the State had 200 farms with an average of 17,000 milk cows that produced 287 million pounds of milk. South Carolina ranked 40th in the Nation for average milk cows, California ranked 1st, Wisconsin 2nd and New York 3rd. Newberry was the leading county with 4,050 milk cows, followed by Orangeburg, Bamberg and Spartanburg.

The 2005 milk production was 1 percent above 2004 and 9 percent below 2003. The

annual average milk per cow at 16,111 pounds compared with 16,882 pounds in 2004 and 16,737 pounds in 2003. Farm value of milk produced, which includes value of fluid milk and cream consumed in farm households, milk used for farm-churned butter, milk fed to calves, as well as marketings of milk and cream totaled \$47,642,000 in 2005 compared with \$49,416,000 in 2004, and \$42,840,000 in 2003. The average price of milk in 2005 was \$16.60 per cwt. compared with \$17.40 in 2004, and \$13.60 in 2003.

SOUTH CAROLINA EQUINE INVENTORY

The 2004 South Carolina Equine Survey, conducted by the South Carolina Field Office of NASS, as a cooperative effort with the SC Department of Agriculture, SC Farm Bureau and the SC Horseman's Council, reported that 84,300 equine resided in South Carolina as of December 31, 2004. This represented an increase of 28 percent from the last survey inventory of 66,000 in 1979. Quarter Horses, at 27,400 head, accounted for the largest portion (32.5 %) of the total inventory, followed by Paints/Pintos, at 7,500 head (8.9%), Tennessee Walkers at 7,400 head (8.8%) and Thoroughbreds with 7,100 head (8.4%). Ponies totaled 3,600 head, Donkeys 3,400 head, Grade Horses 3,300 head, Appaloosas 3,200 head, Arabians 3,000 head, Miniature Horses 2,600 head and Saddlebreds 2,000 head. The estimated value of the State's 84,300 equine totaled \$332 million.

Total expenses of \$402 million were incurred in 2004 by places with resident equine, equine owners who boarded their animals, and individuals with equine expenses but no equine owned or boarded on December 31, 2004. Total sales of equine in 2004 registered \$30 million and an additional \$46 million income was received from boarding fees, breeding fees, training, lessons, etc. With 2004 equine expenses and income measured at \$478 million, equine owners are extremely important to the South Carolina economy.

In addition to the dollars generated by the equine industry, owners and animals improve our quality of life in many other ways. Some examples are equine assisted therapy in the treatment of sexual abuse victims, law enforcement, equine rescue and rehabilitation, guard animals for other livestock such as cattle and goats, and teaching responsibility and work ethic to youth. One survey respondent was undoubtedly representative of many equine owners by the following comment: "We have one 20+ year old horse whose primary job is a 1,000 pound lawn ornament. It's just an old horse that no one but our family wanted and we love her very much."

CHARACTERISTICS of the SOUTH CAROLINA EQUINE INDUSTRY

Based on the results of the 2004 South Carolina Equine Survey, an estimated 260,000 acres of land in South Carolina were dedicated solely to equine purposes. This represents 17.8 percent of the total acreage on places with resident equine.

There were 35,000 people involved in ownership of the State's 84,300 equine. Female owners totaled 18,000 and male owners numbered 17,000. Of the places with resident equine, 11 percent of the operators considered equine to be their primary occupation. The primary occupation of the remaining 89 percent of the operators was not equine related; however, these operators still devoted 11 hours per week to equine activities.

Of the 18,500 places with resident equine, 72.5 percent considered their residence/place as having equine only for pleasure or personal use and 20.2 percent categorized their operation as a farm or ranch. Boarding, riding, or training facilities accounted for 3.8 percent and the remaining 3.5 percent were equine breeding, sales, show/events, or other type of facility.

Equine used primarily for pleasure, trail riding, etc. accounted for 59.7 percent of the total inventory. Equine used primarily for breeding made up 12.2 percent of the total and equine used for show or competition accounted for 10.9 percent. Racing equine registered 3.9 percent of the total and 1.7 percent were primarily used for carriage/cart driving. The remaining 11.6 percent were equine used for farm work, old or retired equine, and all other uses.

Warmbloods registered the highest average value per head at \$17,505, followed by Thoroughbreds at an average value of \$14,715 per head. After these, average values per head dropped significantly with Paso Finos the third highest at \$4,352 per head and \$3,696 for Arabians.

Equine related assets (land, buildings, trucks, trailers, tack, carriages, carts, barrels, jumps, etc.) in South Carolina as of December 31, 2004 totaled \$2.98 billion. The number of paid workers on places with resident equine during 2004 totaled 3,600. Workers employed for 150 days or more accounted for 48 percent of the total. Unpaid workers (family members, neighbors, etc.) on places with resident equine totaled 13,500 with 81 percent of these working 150 days or more in 2004.

EGG PRODUCTION

SOUTH CAROLINA egg production in 2005 totaled 1.29 billion eggs. This was 4 percent below the 1.35 billion eggs produced in 2004 and 6 percent below the 1.37 produced in 2003.

The average number of layers on hand during 2005 was 5,042,000, down 4 percent from the 5,243,000 on hand in 2004 and 5 percent below 2003's 5,325,000 layers.

The annual average rate of lay per layer (including breeders) was 256 eggs in 2005 and 258 eggs in 2004 and in 2003,

South Carolina ranked 19th in the nation for egg production in 2005 with Iowa 1st, Georgia 6th, and North Carolina 12th. Within the State, Newberry County ranked 1st followed by Kershaw, Darlington, Saluda, and Orangeburg counties.

BROILERS RAISED

SOUTH CAROLINA broiler producers raised 213,300,000 broilers in 2005. This was 4 percent more than 2004 and 8 percent more than 2003. Pounds produced totaled 1,279,800,000 in 2005, up 8 percent from 2004. The average price received for broilers in 2005 was 44.0 cents per pound liveweight equivalent, unchanged from 2004, and up 10.0 cents from 2003. Value of production, which includes home consumption, was \$563,112,000, up 8

percent from 2004's \$521,884,000 and 45 percent above 2003's \$389,266,000.

On a county wide basis during 2005, Lexington, Oconee, Aiken, Saluda, and Sumter, were the leading broiler-producing counties in the State. South Carolina ranks 12th in the Nation with Georgia holding the top spot and Arkansas placing 2nd, Alabama 3rd, Mississippi 4th, and North Carolina 5th.

TURKEYS RAISED

Turkeys raised in SOUTH CAROLINA during 2005 totaled 8,000,000 birds, down 33 percent from the 12,000,000 birds raised in 2003 and 2004.

Value of production was \$133,472,000 during 2005, 28 percent below 2004, and 16 percent below 2003. During 2005, the average price received was 43.0 cents per pound, up 3 cents from 2004 and 8 cents above 2003.

CASH RECEIPTS

Preliminary cash receipts from farm marketings in South Carolina during 2005, including government payments, totaled \$2,079,252,000. The \$2.1 billion is 5 percent (\$90 million) above 2004 and 16 percent (\$280 million) above 2003. Government payments for 2005 were \$261 million, in comparison to \$72 million in 2004 and 129 million in 2003. The number one commodity in terms of cash receipts during 2005 was broilers, accounting for 31 percent of the total, excluding government payments.

CROPS cash receipts, at \$728 million, accounted for 40 percent of the total commodity cash receipts during 2005 compared with 43 percent in 2004 and 47 percent in 2003. Preliminary 2005 crops cash receipts decreased \$94 million from 2004 and were down \$53 million from 2003. Greenhouse, nursery and floriculture, cotton and cottonseed and soybeans were the top three crop commodities in 2005 in terms of cash receipts.

LIVESTOCK AND LIVESTOCK PRODUCTS, with cash receipts of \$1,091 million in 2005, accounted for 60 percent of the commodity total compared to 57 percent in 2004 and 53 percent in 2003. Livestock receipts are down \$4.5 million from 2004 but up \$202 million from 2003. Broilers, cattle and calves and turkeys were the top three commodities.


