# SOUTH CAROLINA CROP SUMMARY

2006

**JANUARY:** Higher than normal temperatures prevailed across the State during January. Although rain showers occurred sporadically during the month, rain totals were almost two inches below normal. No heavy frost was reported during the month. The average temperature was 55 degrees, five degrees above normal with the highest reported temperature at 72 degrees and the lowest at 29 degrees. Rainfall was two inches for the month. Some early plowing and land preparation occurred in some areas. Small grains were reported in good shape.

**FEBRUARY:** Temperatures averaged as much as 10 - 12 degrees above normal during the first week of the month; however, the second week, temperatures averaged almost 10 degrees below normal. Temperatures continued cooler than normal until the end of the third week when unseasonably warm weather entered the State. By the end of the month, temperatures had returned to normal. Average rainfall for the month was a little over three inches. Farmers were busy preparing for spring planting by servicing equipment and continuing some plowing and land preparation. Small grains continued in good condition; winter grazing was being used in some areas to supplement cattlemen's winter hay supply.

**MARCH:** Although the beginning of March was mild, by the official start of spring, weather conditions were more like mid-winter. Clouds and cold winds kept high temperatures in the 50's. Heavy rains with amounts exceeding one inch were common across the upstate and central midlands during this time. The cold, below normal temperatures continued through the end of the month with temperatures below freezing at night at many inland sites. For the month, the State average temperature was nine degrees below normal. The average Statewide rainfall for the month was slightly above one inch. During the month, farmers continued with early plowing, soil preparation and planting. Early planting of spring vegetables had begun in some areas. Corn planting was ahead of normal at month's end and some early tobacco transplanting was underway. Small grains were in good condition.

**APRIL:** April began much the same way as March ended with cool dry conditions which lasted until near mid-month when scattered showers began and brought some relief throughout the remainder of the month. Crop conditions suffered during the first part of the month, but the dry weather allowed for good planting progress. As a result of near normal temperatures and month ending rains, the development of small grains was ahead of normal, and planting of most field crops and vegetables was ahead of both the previous year and the 5-year average. Soil moisture was 7% very short, 24% short, 68% adequate and 1% surplus at the end of the month and 26 days were suitable for field work.

**MAY:** Scattered showers during the first three weeks of the month brought some relief to the dry soil moisture conditions, but hot weather during the last week of the month dried the soil back down. Crop development was helped by the showers, but planting was slowed in some areas. All major field and vegetable crops were at or near normal progress by month's end. Soil moisture was 11% very short, 29% short, 57% adequate and 3% surplus at the end of the month, and 23 days were suitable for field work.

**JUNE:** Soil moisture supplies continued to decline during the first two weeks of the month; however, tropical storm Alberto passed through the State near mid-month bringing some needed relief from the dry soil conditions. Scattered showers across the State continued to help soil moisture for the remainder of the month. Temperatures were near normal for most of the month. By month's end, corn, cotton, peanuts, soybeans, and tobacco were all in fair to mostly good condition as were pastures and livestock. Small grains harvest was winding down slightly behind the normal pace due to the month ending showers across the State. Soil moisture was 3% very short, 26% short, 66% adequate and 5% surplus with 23 days suitable for field work.

**JULY:** July was a “normal” summer month in South Carolina with hot, humid weather punctuated by occasional scattered showers with the result being declining soil moisture and crop conditions. Livestock suffered along with the crops as many livestock farmers noted stress to their animals from the heat. The dry weather allowed farmers to finish up small grain harvest by mid-month. Development and harvesting of most field crops was slightly behind normal to normal at the end of the month; conditions varied by crop but were generally fair to mostly good. Soil moisture at month’s end was 19% very short, 49% short and 32% adequate. The dry conditions allowed for 26 days suitable for field work.

**AUGUST:** Hot, humid weather was prevalent throughout August as crops and livestock for the most part continued to suffer. Rainfall during the second and fourth weeks did help soil moisture conditions in many areas. By month’s end, soybeans started dropping leaves and 17 percent of cotton had open bolls with both crops in fair to good condition. Corn harvest at 38 percent, was slightly behind normal with the crop in fair to good shape. Tobacco harvest was 83 percent complete with the remaining crop in fair to mostly good condition. Pastures were rated fair to good while livestock were in mostly good condition at month’s end. Soil moisture at the end of August was 14% very short, 28% short, 56% adequate and 2% surplus while 25 days were suitable for field work.

**SEPTEMBER:** Tropical storm Ernesto brought welcome precipitation to some parts of the State during the first week of September, but not all areas received rain. Fortunately, scattered showers the next two weeks helped soil moisture in most areas before dry weather the last week shut down the precipitation. Crop development and harvesting was near normal for most field crops. Peach harvest was finished during the month; apple harvest was behind normal at month’s end. Livestock remained in mostly good condition, and pastures were rated fair to good. Soil moisture was 4% very short, 28% short, and 68% adequate. There were approximately 25 days suitable for field work.

**OCTOBER:** Dry weather aided harvesting through much of the month although showers the second and last weeks were beneficial to most crops and aided small grain development. By month’s end, most field crops could be found in the fair to good range. Farmers made near normal progress in harvesting activities during the month although at the end of the month cotton and soybean harvests were each five points behind normal. Livestock remained in mostly good condition, while pastures had shown some improvement from the previous month. Soil moisture was 9% short, 88% adequate, and 3% surplus. There were approximately 25 days suitable for field work.

**NOVEMBER:** November began with cool, dry temperatures which provided excellent harvesting conditions. Unfortunately, the harvesting activities were delayed by showers that came to the State during the second week of the month and occurred periodically through the remainder of the month. The end of month precipitation was noteworthy in that snow was seen in upstate areas, uncharacteristic for this time of the year. The showers during the month did aid development of small grain crops, but interfered with small grain planting in some areas. The soybean crop’s condition was fair to mostly good by the end of the month, but harvesting was 11 points behind normal. Cotton was in fair to good condition throughout the State, but harvest was about seven points behind normal. Small grain planting still lagged behind at month’s end. By the end of November, soil moisture was 7% short, 72% adequate and 21% surplus. There were 21 days suitable for field work.

**DECEMBER:** The month began with unseasonably warm temperatures during the first week, but the second week had a complete reversal with record cold temperatures that averaged nine degrees below normal. Temperatures were above normal from then until the last few days of the month. Dry weather during the first few weeks of December allowed farmers to catch up with harvesting and planting activities, but rain that came near the end of the third week persisted through the rest of the month and shut down harvesting of cotton and soybeans in many areas. More snow was observed during the last week of the month. Farmers were active finishing up small grain planting and field crop harvesting when the weather allowed.



## GRAIN STORAGE CAPACITY Off-Farm and On-Farm

Capacity of **Off-Farm** commercial grain storage totaled 20.0 million bushels in SOUTH CAROLINA on December 1, 2006, 1 percent below December 1, 2005. With this capacity, South Carolina ranks 34<sup>th</sup> in the United States.

Off-farm grain storage facilities in South Carolina totaled 71 on December 1, 2006, down 3 from December 1, 2005.

## **NURSERY, FLORICULTURE, HORTICULTURE AND TURFGRASS**

### **FLORICULTURE**

Total crop value of all floriculture crops for all South Carolina growers with \$10,000 or more in sales in 2006 was estimated at \$101 million, down 5 percent compared to \$106 million in 2005. There were 92 growers in 2006, down from 103 in 2005. Total covered area for floriculture crop production was recorded at 10.0 million square feet, up from 9.46 million square feet in 2005. Total greenhouse space covered area at 7.15 million square feet was up from 2005's 6.96 million square feet.

Growers with \$100,000 plus in total sales posted a wholesale value of plant production during 2006 of \$93.4 million, down from \$96.3 million in 2005. The wholesale value of bedding and garden plants, the largest part of production, totaled \$79.7 million, up from \$77.5 million in 2005.

## FARM NUMBERS AND LAND IN FARMS

The number of farms in SOUTH CAROLINA in 2006 is estimated at 24,600, up 100 from the 24,500 in 2005 and up 200 from the 24,400 in 2004. Total land in farms for 2006 is 4.85 million acres, unchanged from 2005 and 2004. The average size of farms in 2006 was 197 acres, down one acre from 2005 and two acres from 2004. Farms with \$100,000 or more in sales totaled 1,800 in 2006, accounting for 7.3 percent of all farms and no change from 2005 or 2004.

The number of farms in the UNITED STATES in 2006 is estimated at 2.1 million, less than one percent fewer than in 2005. Total land in farms, at 932.4 million acres, decreased 780 thousand acres, from 2005. The average farm size was 446 acres in 2006, an increase of one acre from the previous year. The decline in the number of farms and land in farms reflects a continuing consolidation in farming operations and diversion of agricultural land to nonagricultural uses.

A **farm** is defined as "any establishment from which \$1,000 or more of agricultural products were sold or normally would be sold during the year." Government payments are included in sales. Institutional farms experimental and research farms, and Indian Reservations are included as farms. Places with their entire acreage enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program, set aside, or other government programs are considered operating farms if they receive \$1,000 or more in payments. Operations with 5 or more horses or ponies and no other agricultural sales are also counted as farms. Operations with fewer than 5 equine and at least \$1,000 in agricultural sales qualified as farms.

**Land in farms** is all land operated by farms during the year. It includes crop and livestock acreage, wasteland, woodland, pasture, land in summer fallow, idle cropland, and land enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program and other set aside or commodity acreage programs. It excludes all public, industrial, and grazing association land. It excludes all land operated by establishments not qualifying as farms.

# LIVESTOCK INVENTORY

## ALL CATTLE AND CALVES

The South Carolina cattle industry had a total of 400,000 cattle and calves as of January 1, 2007 with 10,200 cattle farms. There was a total of 203,000 beef cows and 17,000 milk cows in the inventory.

The 2006 calf crop totaled 175,000 head, down 3 percent from 2005 and 10 percent from 2004. The calving

rate for these years was 78.7 percent for 2006 and 77.4 percent for 2005. South Carolina ranked 39<sup>th</sup> in the Nation for all cattle and calves, with Texas ranked 1<sup>st</sup>, Nebraska ranked 2<sup>nd</sup>, Kansas ranked 3<sup>rd</sup>, and California ranked 4<sup>th</sup>. The leading county in South Carolina was Anderson, followed by Laurens, Newberry, Saluda and Spartanburg.

## EGG PRODUCTION

SOUTH CAROLINA egg production in 2006 totaled 1.28 billion eggs. This was 1 percent below the 1.29 billion eggs produced in 2005 and 5 percent below the 1.35 produced in 2004.

The average number of layers on hand during 2006 was 5,010,000, down 1 percent from the 5,042,000 on hand in 2005 and 4 percent below 2004's 5,243,000 layers.

The annual average rate of lay per layer (including breeders) was 256 eggs in 2006 and in 2005 and 258 eggs in 2004.

South Carolina ranked 20<sup>th</sup> in the nation for egg production in 2006 with Iowa 1<sup>st</sup>, Georgia 7<sup>th</sup>, and North Carolina 12<sup>th</sup>. Within the State, Kershaw County ranked 1<sup>st</sup> followed by Newberry, Saluda, and Orangeburg counties.

## BROILERS RAISED

SOUTH CAROLINA broiler producers raised 227,100,000 broilers in 2006. This was 6 percent more than the 2005 total of 213,300,000 and 11 percent more than 204,500,000 in 2004. Pounds produced totaled 1,408,000,000 in 2006, up 10 percent from 2005 and 19 percent above 2004. The average price received for broilers in 2006 was 40.0 cents per pound liveweight equivalent, down 4.0 cents from 2005 and 2004. Value of production,

which includes home consumption, was \$563,200,000, up less than 1 percent from 2005's \$563,112,000 and 8 percent above 2004's value of \$521,884,000. On a county wide basis during 2006, Lexington, Oconee, Aiken, Saluda, and Orangeburg, were the leading broiler-producing counties in the State. South Carolina ranks 12<sup>th</sup> in the Nation with Georgia holding the top spot and Arkansas placing 2<sup>nd</sup>, Alabama 3<sup>rd</sup>, Mississippi 4<sup>th</sup>, and North Carolina 5<sup>th</sup>.

## BROILERS RAISED

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which includes home consumption, was \$563,200,000, up less than 1 percent from 2005's \$563,112,000 and 8 percent above 2004's value of \$521,884,000. On a county wide basis during 2006, Lexington, Oconee, Aiken, Saluda, and Orangeburg, were the leading broiler-producing counties in the State. South Carolina ranks 12<sup>th</sup> in the Nation with Georgia holding the top spot and Arkansas placing 2<sup>nd</sup>, Alabama 3<sup>rd</sup>, Mississippi 4<sup>th</sup>, and North Carolina 5<sup>th</sup>.

## TURKEYS RAISED

Turkeys raised in SOUTH CAROLINA during 2006 totaled 9,600,000 birds, up 20 percent from the 8,000,000 birds raised in 2005, but down 20 percent from 2004. Value of production was \$177,523,000 during 2006, 33

percent above the 2005 value of \$133,472,000, but 4 percent below the 2004 value of \$185,280,000. During 2006, the average price received was 46.0 cents per pound, up 3 cents from 2005 and up 6 cents from 2004.

# SOUTH CAROLINA

## CASH RECEIPTS

Preliminary cash receipts from farm marketings in South Carolina during 2006, including government payments, totaled \$2,074,908,000. The \$2.1 billion is 1 percent (\$13 million) below 2005 but 4 percent (\$85 million) above 2004. Government payments for 2006 were \$184 million, in comparison to \$261 million in 2005 and 72 million in 2004. The number one commodity in terms of cash receipts during 2006 was broilers, accounting for 30 percent of the total, excluding government payments.

CROPS cash receipts, at \$788 million, accounted for 42 percent of the total commodity cash receipts during 2006 compared with 40 percent in 2005 and 43 percent in 2004. Preliminary 2006 crops cash receipts increased \$51 million from 2005 but were down \$34 million from 2004. Greenhouse, nursery and floriculture, cotton and cottonseed and tobacco were the top three crop commodities in 2006 in terms of cash receipts.

LIVESTOCK AND LIVESTOCK PRODUCTS, with cash receipts of \$1,103 million in 2006, accounted for 58 percent of the commodity total compared to 60 percent in 2005 and 57 percent in 2004. Livestock receipts are up \$12.3 million from 2005 and up \$7 million from 2004. Broilers, turkeys, and cattle and calves were the top three commodities.


