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


2010 SOUTH CAROLINA CROP SUMMARY

JANUARY: 2010 began with sunny, mild weather that soon gave way to cold temperatures. By the end of the first week in January, most areas were reporting high temperatures not exceeding the thirties. Some areas in the Upstate experienced snow showers. Midway through the month the State saw rising temperatures with highs in the 60's in some areas accompanied by heavy rainfall. This rain would exit, followed by a frontal boundary bringing in cold temperatures once again. Low temperatures returned and stayed through January, bringing freezing rain as far south as Charleston and snow showers to much of the Midlands, Piedmont and Upstate. By the end of the month, both Columbia and Charleston's average temperature was their coldest in 22 years. State average temperature for the month was 17 degrees below normal. The State average rainfall for the period was 4.9 inches.

FEBRUARY: The first week of February continued the State's cold snap with a hard freeze. Several low pressure systems traveled through the State, bringing high winds, rain, and rare winter weather totals to certain areas. Columbia airport measured 8.6 inches of snow, the highest total seen there in 37 years. After the snow event, warm weather returned temporarily to much of the State with some areas in the Lowcountry reporting temperatures as high as 71 degrees. By the end of the month, however, cold weather returned, contributing to the coldest February in 30 years for all areas of the State. On average, the State temperature was 6 degrees below normal. The State average rainfall for the month was 3.2 inches.

MARCH: Cold temperatures continued to plague the State bringing snow showers to the Upstate and Midlands. By the second week in March, however, many areas began to see warmer temperatures with mercury readings well into the high seventies. This warm front also brought rain over most portions of the State. High temperatures would hold near 70 in most areas through the month. Severe weather accompanied the warmer temperatures with many areas in the Upstate seeing golf-ball sized hail on occasions and tornado warnings for the Midlands. Temperatures remained low at night, contributing to the unsettled weather and an overall State average temperature of 10 degrees below normal for the month. The State average rainfall was 2.3 inches, providing a stable soil moisture base for the beginning of the planting season.

APRIL: April ushered in the warmest weather of the year to date. Most areas of the State experienced hot, dry days, hampering soil conditions due to a lack of moisture. Aided by the dry weather, corn planting continued and was reportedly 97% planted by month end. Tobacco transplanting continued on well ahead of the five-year average with 92% transplanted by May. Severe weather affected much of the state on two separate occasions bringing the majority of the 1.7 inches of rain on average that the State received. These episodes provided relief from the dry conditions and washed away accumulated pollen spores on surfaces. The State average temperature for the month was four degrees above normal.

MAY: Dry conditions coupled with warm temperatures continued to triumph over much of the State into May. Temperatures reached record highs in some areas in the first week of May, bringing thunderstorms carrying much needed rain. Pastures and field crops revived with the renewed moisture helping to improve vegetable and fruit conditions. Despite the rainfall, small grain production was down due to prevailing dry conditions. Cotton and peanut planting continued on schedule with 93 and 80 percent planted respectively by the end of May. Rain continued to fall throughout the month reaching a monthly average of 2.3 inches. The State average temperature was 3 degrees above normal for the period.

JUNE: Heavy rainfall characterized the beginning of the month with many areas reporting substantial crop growth due to improved conditions. This would not continue as the last three weeks in June brought record-high temperatures and very little rainfall. The combined effect had operators reporting most major crops experiencing stress, with the exception of tobacco. Corn growers reported concerns over yield loss due to 100 degree-plus weather affecting crops in the crucial maturation stage. Soybeans managed to stay ahead of schedule with 87 percent of the crop emerging by month end. While the State received 3.7 inches of rainfall on average in June, more than 60 percent of it fell in the first week causing arid conditions for the remainder of the month. Columbia tied its record high average temperature of 83.7 degrees for the month while Charleston set its record high average temperature of 83.4.

JULY: The month of July began with a break in temperatures, providing a cooling relief with scattered thunderstorms through July 4th. Crop condition improved in the cooler temperatures with improved soil moisture levels. This pattern would not hold, however. Conditions after the first week in July were dominated by near or above triple digits temperatures and frequent violent thunderstorms. All crops surveyed during the intense heat reported a decline in conditions. The majority of cotton had squared through July, with half of the crop setting bolls. Almost all peanuts had pegged by month end, ahead of the five-year average. Soil moisture conditions regressed with most reporting a shortage. The State average temperature was 2.5 degrees above normal. The State average rainfall for the period was 6.1 inches.

AUGUST: Most areas of the State received badly needed rain this month. Every week brought rainfall in many areas of the State, replenishing the moisture levels in field crops and pastures. However, this was coupled with continuing high temperatures, affecting both crop and livestock conditions. Reports of army worm and grasshopper infestations added to the problems that operators faced this month. Nearly all corn had matured by month's end and the peanut crop had completed pegging. Tobacco production continued ahead of the five-year average with 86% of the crop harvested in this period. 80% of soybeans had set bloom, although some operators reported pod issues due to extreme heat earlier in the season. The State average temperature for the week was 3.75 degrees above normal. The State average rainfall for the period was 4.6 inches.

SEPTEMBER: The State continued to be plagued by sizzling temperatures in September. This problem was intensified by the lack of rain in the month. For the first three weeks rain was almost non-existent, causing crop and livestock conditions to decline and delaying the planting of winter grazings. Relief was provided in the latter portion of the month with more consistent rainfall, much in the form of Tropical Storm Nicole. Temperatures behind this storm finally began to fall as the State experienced its first week below normal temperatures since July 4th. Crops continued to be harvested ahead of schedule due to fears of yield loss from extreme temperatures and the continued army worm infestation. The State average temperature was 3.4 degrees above normal. The State average rainfall for the period was 4.2 inches, with 4 inches accumulating in the last two weeks.

OCTOBER: October brought some much needed lower temperatures to the State, providing excellent weather for operators to harvest their crops. The State did experience some rain in the latter part of the month, but for the most part, pleasant weather was abundant. Cotton harvesting persisted ahead of the five-year average with 64% completed by the end of the month. The peanut harvest began to wind down, while soybeans began to be harvested as they completed the maturation stages. Over half of the winter grazings had been planted, and winter wheat was able to reach a 25% planted level. Oats were also 30% planted by November. The State average temperature was a pleasant 2.25 degrees above normal, while average rainfall totaled 1.2 inches.

NOVEMBER: November effectively brought the end of the growing season as the State experienced its first frosts of the season. While temperatures remained colder than normal toward the beginning of the month, they began to normalize as November continued. Operators were able to utilize the clear weather to complete their harvesting and continue with winter crop plantings. By the end of November, nearly all cotton had been picked and ginning was in full swing. Soybeans were 70% harvested as leaves finished dropping in the cool weather. Almost all winter grazings had been planted, and oats and winter wheat were rapidly being planted and beginning to emerge. Very little rainfall allowed much time to be spent in the fields as the State average rainfall for the month only totaled .9 inches. The State average temperature was less than a degree above normal.

DECEMBER: Cold temperatures and winter precipitation dominated December. During the first two weeks of December, the average temperature recorded at the Columbia, Florence and Greer Airports was the coldest on record, while Charleston Airport recorded the second coldest to date. Snow flurries fell in the early part of the month in Charleston, Dorchester and Colleton counties, but this would only be a pre-cursor to the snow that would follow Christmas. By late afternoon on the 26th, Caesars Head measured 7 inches, Mullins measured 5 inches, and even Hilton Head reported flurries. Frigid temperatures followed the snow creating road issues for much of the Midlands and Upstate. December saw average temperatures for the State at 6.25 degrees below normal. The State average rainfall totaled 2.1 inches.



NURSERY, FLORICULTURE, HORTICULTURE AND TURFGRASS

FLORICULTURE

Total crop value of all floriculture crops for all South Carolina growers with \$10,000 or more in sales in 2010 was estimated at \$93.4 million, down 7 percent compared to \$100.3 million in 2009. There were 87 growers in 2010, down from 98 in 2009. Total covered area for floriculture crop production was recorded at 5.00 million square feet, down from 5.18 million square feet in 2009. Total greenhouse space covered area at 4.43 million square feet was down from 2009's 4.61 million square feet.

Growers with \$100,000 plus in total sales posted a wholesale value of plant production during 2010 of \$90.3 million, down from \$97.8 million in 2009. The wholesale value of bedding and garden plants, the largest part of production, totaled \$77.7 million, down from \$84.2 million in 2009.

FARM NUMBERS AND LAND IN FARMS

The number of farms in SOUTH CAROLINA in 2010 is estimated at 27,000, unchanged from 2009 and up 100 from the 26,900 in 2008. Total land in farms for 2010 is 4.90 million acres, unchanged from 2009 and 2008. The average size of farms in 2010 was 181 acres, unchanged from 2009, but 2 acres below 2008. Farms with \$100,000 or more in sales totaled 2,200 in 2010, accounting for 8.1 percent of all farms. Farms with \$100,000 or more in sales in 2009 and 2008 totaled 2,000.

The number of farms in the United States in 2010 is estimated at 2.2 million, virtually unchanged from 2009. Total land in farms, at 920.0 million acres, increased 100 thousand acres from 2009. The average farm size is 418 acres, unchanged from the previous year. The average farm size was unchanged in 2010. However, average farm sizes declined in some of the sales classes partially due to smaller farms moving up to higher sales classes.

A **farm** is defined as any establishment from which \$1,000 or more of agricultural products were sold or normally would be sold during the year. Government payments are included in sales. Institutional farms experimental and research farms, and Indian Reservations are included as farms. Places with their entire acreage enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program, set aside, or other government programs are considered operating farms if they receive \$1,000 or more in payments. Operations with 5 or more horses or ponies and no other agricultural sales are also counted as farms. Operations with fewer than 5 equine and at least \$1,000 in agricultural sales qualified as farms.

Land in farms is all land operated by farms during the year. It includes crop and livestock acreage, wasteland, woodland, pasture, land in summer fallow, idle cropland, and land enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program and other set aside or commodity acreage programs. It excludes all public, industrial, and grazing association land. It excludes all land operated by establishments not qualifying as farms.




ALL CATTLE AND CALVES

The South Carolina cattle industry had a total of 385,000 cattle and calves as of January 1, 2011. There were a total of 184,000 beef cows and 16,000 milk cows in the inventory.

The 2010 calf crop totaled 165,000 head, unchanged from 2009 and 2008.

South Carolina ranked 38th in the Nation for all cattle and calves, with Texas ranked 1st, Kansas ranked 2nd, Nebraska ranked 3rd, and California ranked 4th. The leading county in South Carolina was Anderson, followed by Saluda, Newberry, Laurens and Chester.

BROILERS RAISED

SOUTH CAROLINA broiler producers raised 241,000,000 broilers in 2010. This was 1 percent more than the 2009 total of 237,800,000 and 2 percent more than 236,900,000 in 2007. Pounds produced totaled 1,556,900,000 in 2010, up 2 percent from 2009 and 3 percent above 2008. The average price received for broilers in 2010 was 48.0 cents per pound liveweight equivalent, up 2.0 cents from 2009 and 2008. Value of production, which includes home consumption, was

\$750,426,000, up 8 percent from 2009's \$695,508,000 and 8 percent above 2008's value of \$697,452,000. On a county wide basis during 2010, Oconee, Lexington, Aiken, Orangeburg, and Saluda, were the leading broiler-producing counties in the State. South Carolina ranks 10th in the Nation with Georgia holding the top spot and Arkansas placing 2nd, Alabama 3rd, Mississippi 4th, and North Carolina 5th.

TURKEYS RAISED

Turkeys raised in SOUTH CAROLINA during 2010 totaled 11,900,000 birds, unchanged from 2009, but down 5 percent from 2008. Value of production was \$262,050,000 during 2010, 19 percent above the 2009

value of \$220,050,000, but 2 percent below the 2008 value of \$267,400,000. During 2010, the average price received was 61.0 cents per pound, up 10 cents from 2009, and 5 cents from 2008.




SOUTH CAROLINA

CASH RECEIPTS

Preliminary cash receipts from farm marketings in South Carolina during 2010, including government payments, totaled \$2,348,737,000. The \$2.3 billion is 9 percent (\$196 million) above 2009 and 1 percent (\$20 million) above 2008. Government payments for 2010 were \$125 million, in comparison to \$151 million in 2009 and \$153 million in 2008. The number one commodity in terms of cash receipts during 2010 was broilers, accounting for 31.5 percent of the total, excluding government payments.

CROPS cash receipts, at \$1,015 billion, accounted for 42.5 percent of the total commodity cash receipts during 2010 compared with 42.8 percent in 2009 and 42.1 percent in 2008. Preliminary 2010 crops cash receipts increased \$76 million from 2009 and up \$19 million from 2008. Greenhouse/nursery/floriculture, corn and soybeans were the top three crop commodities in 2010 in terms of cash receipts.

LIVESTOCK AND LIVESTOCK PRODUCTS, with cash receipts of \$1,370 billion in 2010, accounted for 57.5 percent of the commodity total compared to 57.1 percent in 2009 and 57.8 percent in 2008. Livestock receipts are up \$120 million from 2009 and up \$870 thousand from 2008. Broilers, turkeys, and cattle and calves were the top three commodities.
