General

According to the National Agricultural Statistics Service in South Carolina, there were 6.2 days suitable for fieldwork for the week ending Sunday, May 9, 2021. Precipitation ranged from no rain to 3.83 inches. Average high temperatures ranged from the high 60s to the mid 80s. Average low temperatures ranged from the low 40s to the high 50s.

Crops

Beneficial rainfall was received from isolated storms during the first part of week, although some areas also experienced pockets of heavy wind and hail. Peanut planting continued at a normal pace based on improved soil moisture. Cotton planting continued to advance in spite of cool nighttime temperatures. Corn appears to have recovered from the frost damage of a couple of weeks ago and was growing at a healthy pace.

Harvest of early peach varieties has begun around the state and the quality of the fruit was looking good. Blueberries were slightly behind typical development, but harvest should begin in the next few days. Muscadines damaged by the Easter freeze appear to be recovering well. Strawberry harvest was slowing down, and disease presence intensified as a result of the increased soil moisture. Vegetable planting has resumed, and standing crops were progressing nicely as a result of cool temperatures and improved soil moisture.

Livestock and Pastures

Pasture development continues to be limited due to continued dry weather and cool temperatures, although rainfall early in the week helped to stabilize conditions. Cattle were in mostly good condition.





Average Temperature (°F)


