



The January 1, 2021, Texas **grapefruit production** is forecast at 5.00 million boxes for the 2020-2021 season, up 14 percent from last year's final production of 4.40 million boxes. All **orange production** is forecast at 1.50 million boxes, up 12 percent from last year's final production of 1.34 million boxes. Early and midseason oranges account for 1.30 million boxes and Valencias account for 200 thousand boxes.
