## CRANBERRIES



The forecast for the 2012 cranberry crop is 7.68 million barrels, down less than 1 percent from 2011. Growers in Wisconsin reported excellent pollination and limited impact by the summer's high temperatures and dry conditions. In Massachusetts, an early spring caused growth to progress ahead of normal and growers in some areas experienced frost damage. Growers reported good conditions for bloom and pollination in the State but suffered from heat stress due to recent high temperatures and dry conditions. In New Jersey, growers reported an average crop that required more irrigation than normal due to hot, dry weather. In Oregon and Washington, growers reported cool, wet growing conditions that delayed crop progress in some areas. The 2012 Washington crop is forecast at 142,000 barrels, a significant increase over 2011 production of 115,700 barrels. For the current 2012 growing season, a significant drag has been a cool summer. In July, berries were still in bloom stage at some locations. Summer growing conditions in Oregon have been much better, and crop condition and yield is expected to be higher than Washington State.

## MILK PRODUCTION

Milk production for Washington in July 2012 totaled 527 million pounds, 18 million pounds fewer than July 2011. Production per cow averaged 2,020 pounds. The number of milk cows on Washington farms was estimated at 261,000 head, 4,000 head fewer than last year. Milk production in the 23 major states during July totaled 15.5 billion pounds, compared with 15.4 in July 2011. June 2012 production for the 23 major states, at 15.5 billion pounds, was up 1.1 percent from June 2011.

## SELECTED POTATO STOCKS IN COLD STORAGE

Frozen French fries in storage for the three Pacific Coast states and eight Mountain states on July 31, 2012 totaled 532.3 million pounds. Total potatoes in storage for the three Pacific Coast states and eight Mountain states on July 31, 2012 totaled 654.5 million pounds, and accounted for 61 percent of the Nation's total potatoes in storage.
