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USDA TO MEASURE MAPLE SYRUP PRODUCTION

Last spring, 563,000 gallons of maple syrup were produced in New England; 32 percent below the previous year's production and the smallest maple syrup crop produced in the region since 1993. Nationwide, there was a 15 percent decrease in production. Combined, the New England States were responsible for 54 percent of national production and the top three producing States were Vermont, Maine and New York.

The New England Agricultural Statistics Service, a field office of USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS), is responsible for publishing the official USDA maple production statistics for five New England States (except Rhode Island). These figures are based on an annual survey of maple producers. This program is supported by the North American Maple Syrup Council as the basis for many decisions made by producers throughout the region. (Michigan, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin are also in this national program.)

Maple producers are asked to complete the survey because they are the best source of information about production and prices. Response to the Maple Syrup Inquiry is voluntary, however, there is no other way to accurately measure the current year's production or previous year's price. Good cooperation from maple syrup producers is needed for an accurate measurement of the maple industry in New England and nationwide. In Vermont, producers with 100 to 2,999 taps are sampled and operations having 3,000 or more taps are all sent a questionnaire. The other four New England States in the program are treated like a census, where any known producer with more than 100 taps is sent a questionnaire.

Every effort is made to contact all maple syrup producers selected for this very important project so the published statistics are timely and accurate. About 2,500 questionnaires will be mailed to New England producers in April and those who do not return their forms by May will be contacted by telephone from the Concord, New Hampshire office and asked to help with the survey.

Individual producer reports are kept strictly confidential and used only with other reports for statistical purposes. NASS does not give any individual information to other agencies or persons as it is exempt from requests based on the Freedom of Information Act.

The national survey results will be available in the **Crop Production Report** from Washington, D.C. on June 12, 2002 at 8:30 a.m. All reports are available on the Internet within minutes of the scheduled release time. The New England field office also publishes the statistics on June 14 in a special **Maple Syrup** release which includes charts, graphs, and comments from producers. The statistics are reprinted in the June issue of the **Ag Review**. The monthly New England **Ag Review** is available on the Internet and complimentary copies will be mailed to survey participants upon request.
